



Traps in a Loop




Trappers are legally required to check restraining-type traps and non-lethal cable restraints at least once every 24 hours in Zones 2 and 3 (MI Lower Peninsula) and at least once within each 48-hour period in Zone 1 (MI Upper Peninsula).






Body Grip- Conibear



Foot Traps-Normal








Identify the Animal

Fire Only Once
